On a very snowy evening in December, over 20 leaders gathered to learn and share their own insights at the first gathering of PEI's cultural community leaders, convened by PEI PIP. The agenda included several presenters, Nathan LaCroix for Pride PEI, Lisa Dollar, Cultural Inclusion Trainor with IRSA, and Jenn Mah and Divine Ngeh Budzi for Equity Project/ARAISA. ## "PIP"? "LIP"? WHAT DO THEY MEAN?



LIPs (Local Immigration Partnerships) were created by IRCC in communities across Canada first in Ontario in 2009 and nationally in 2012. They support immigrant retention by bringing stakeholders of all levels to the table to try to solve the pressing issues and create welcoming and thriving communities. The name PIP (Provincial Immigration Partnership) is unique to PEI, as we cover the entire province.

LIPs may be housed in municipal offices, settlement agencies, or other non-profits, however they are a separate entity. For example, the PEI PIP is housed at Immigrant & Refugee Services Association PEI (IRSA), but does not specifically represent IRSA. Rather, PIP serves as a hub for many partners and stakeholders.

# INVESTING IN CANADA'S SHARED FUTURE: PATHWAY TO POSSIBILITIES

On November 26, 2025, the Pathways to Prosperity Partnership and the FCFA hosted a national conference themed "Investing in Canada's Shared Future: Pathways to Possibilities." The second portion of the event, with a focus on LIPs, brought together 210 in-person and 90 virtual participants from Local Immigration Partnerships and Réseaux en immigration francophone. Highlights included a plenary on building future-ready networks, a series of in-person and virtual workshops, and a collaborative hackathon. The 2025 Accomplishments of LIPs and RIF compendium was also released, showcasing key achievements from the past two years.
